Pastoral Reflections

Rev. David F. Peters, Minister

This past month, Susan and I discovered that her debit card was compromised. We found a series of charges over a three-day period that we did not make. We contacted the bank to report it and got a new card for her. Now we have to put in the time and frustration of having the charges reversed. As of this writing, it has not been going well. We feel like we have been violated. It is a reminder of the undependability of the things that we place trust in.

This is not an unusual story, many of you probably have been through this as well and can relate.

Trust is something that is most strongly felt in its absence. We go through our daily lives trusting in so many things. We drive down the road and see a car coming to a stop sign on a side road. We trust that they will stop and not run out in front of us or crash into us. We trust that the buildings and roads we use have been well engineered and are safe for us. We trust in our leaders to be informed, guide us, and have the greater good in focus and not personal gain or power.

Our dollar bill has “In God We Trust” on it, while a relatively recent addition, it speaks of that greater good, higher power that moves us to think beyond self.

Trust comes into play as we consider the attitude that one has as we begin each and every day. If we begin with an attitude of mis-trust, then we look at every interaction, every encounter with suspicion.

I believe in a God in whom I place my trust. A God who endows me with a faith to put trust “out there” to guide me and to know that even when someday I find myself wanting to be mis-trustful of everything and everyone, God is still constant, trustworthy.

I seek to have our church and its ministries be one on which you can trust. We work off of core values of serving others, with transparent business practices and encourage trusting relationships among its members and those we seek to serve in Christ’s name.

Daily Bread Food Pantry

After a lengthy discussion with Peter Kent, Daily Bread Food Pantry President, we came up with the following list of items they need and want, and items that they have ready access to so don't need as donations.

YES - items needed/wanted are: cereal (hot and cold), pasta and pasta sauce, canned veggies, soup, common spices and condiments, coffee (instant and ground) flour, Hamburger Helper, cake mixes and frosting, rice (white) and dried beans.

Items that are very popular and selected immediately are: vegetable oil, sugar (white), laundry detergent, and dishwashing detergent. Other popular non-food items are: toothpaste, tooth brushes, hand soap, shampoo, and feminine hygiene products.

NO - Items NOT needed/wanted are: mac & cheese, boxed milk, meat, canned tuna, peanut butter, butter, eggs and stuffing mix.

The food pantry gets items from the CT Food Bank (weekly delivery) that are on the NO list, so it is best to donate items that are on the YES list.

In addition to the items mentioned above, clients receive frozen meat, milk, eggs, and fresh produce each time they visit. Currently three visits per month are allowed, although no-one is turned away without food if they are in need.

On another note, the client distribution days are Tuesday and Friday, 9:30 – 11:00. About 30 people are needed on client distribution days. There is an in-place crew for distribution days, which is held outside. If you'd like to help, there is always the odd job that needs doing.

Donation days are Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, 11:30 – 1:30. If you would like to be a receiver of donations at the Food Pantry, contact Daily Bread's Volunteer Coordinator Marybeth Alpuche (mbalpuce@aol.com). Neighbors in Need Offering Sunday, Sept. 19

Neighbors in Need (NIN) is a special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). Two-thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. Neighbors in Need grants are awarded to UCC churches and organizations doing justice work in their communities. These grants fund projects whose work ranges from direct service to community organizing and advocacy to address systemic injustice. This year, special consideration will be given to projects focusing on serving our immigrant neighbors and communities.

Our Church, like most UCC congregations, will receive the NIN offering on **October 4, 2020** as part of their World Communion Sunday observance.

There will specially marked envelopes for your use and gifts will be on your financial statements.



Plastic Film Recycling

This is the recycling of plastic film. So far, I know that Southbury Stop & Shop has a receptacle by their entrance, and Whole Foods takes it at their customer service desk. I will continue to investigate other drop off options.

Please save your plastic film and recycle it. You will be doing your part to help the environment :)

See examples of plastic film below:

Retail, carryout, produce, newspaper, bread, and dry cleaning bags (clean, dry and free of receipts and clothes hangers)

- Zip-top food storage bags (clean and dry)
- Plastic shipping envelopes (remove labels), bubble wrap and air pillows (deflate)

- Product wrap on cases of water/soda bottles, paper towels, napkins, disposable cups, bathroom tissue, diapers, and female sanitary products
- Furniture and electronic wrap
- Plastic cereal box liners (**but** if it tears like paper, **do not include**)
- Any film packaging or bag that has the How2Recycle Label shown at right
